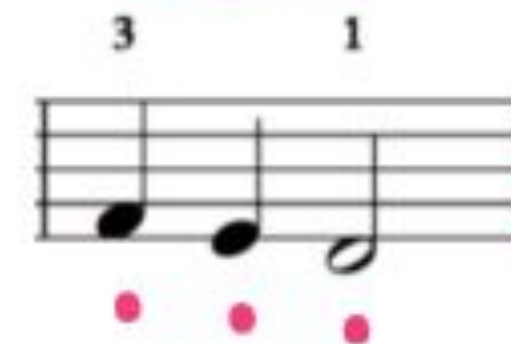
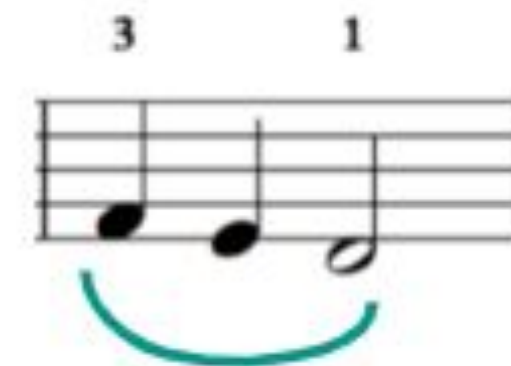
- **Ornaments:**
