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## Primary chords

There are some chords more important than others. These are the primary chords. They are used to harmonise many melodies.

## Secondary chords

In a major key, there are always 3 chords that are minor. These are chords 2,3 and 6 and they are called the secondary chords.

| C | Dm | Em | F | G | Am | B |
| I | ii | iii | IV | V | vi | vii |

## Chord progressions

- A chord progression is the same as a chord sequence. It is a repeated set of chords.
- Chord progressions often use a mix of primary and secondary chords.
- A song might use more than one chord progression.
