




Present tense

-er and ir verbs:

To talk about 'we' with an action we do now, remove –er/ir from the infinitive and add these endings:



To talk about 'they' with an action they do now, remove –er/ir from the infinitive and add these endings:





Preterite tense -er and ir verbs:

To talk about 'we' with an action <u>completed in the past</u> remove –er/ir from the infinitive and add these endings:

Comer — Comimos

Subir Subimos

To talk about 'they' with an action <u>completed in the past</u>, remove –er/ir from the infinitive and add these endings:

Comer — Comieron

Subir Subieron
