Glossary

- Regulation To make rules concerning a particular area such as the media, which is under control of an authority.
- **Ofcom -** The Office of Communications, commonly known as Ofcom, is the government-approved regulatory authority for film, TV and radio in the United Kingdom.
- **Censorship** Censorship is when an authority (such as a government) cuts out or suppresses information and or communication.
- Defamation law Laws that prevent untrue statements to be spoken or written to protect an individual's reputation.
- Privacy law refers to the rules that deal with the use of personal information.
