être à l'heure	to be on time
faire les devoirs	to do homework
porter l'uniforme scolaire	to wear school uniform
mâcher du chewing-gum	to chew gum
utiliser les portables	to use mobile phones
porter des bijoux	to wear jewellery
se maquiller	to wear makeup
avoir des piercings	to have body piercings
apprendre	to learn
enseigner	to teach



The infinitive can also be translated by the gerund.

Faire les devoirs - to do homework AND **doing** homework.



Devoir - have to / must (irregular verb)

Use **devoir** with an infinitive to say what someone must do:

On doit **t** porter **er** l'uniforme scolaire.



You (*general*) must wear school
uniform.

On **ne** doit **pas** porter **er** des bijoux.



You (*general*) must not wear
jewellery.



Expressing Obligation

Il faut

porter l'uniforme scolaire.



It is necessary to wear school uniform.

Il est interdit de

porter des bijoux.



It is forbidden to wear jewellery.

Il faut and **il est interdit de** are both followed by the infinitive.



Using the impersonal 'il' - it

Il faut

porter l'uniforme scolaire.



Il faut is an **impersonal** verb. It can only be conjugated in the **il** form.

Il est interdit de

porter des bijoux.



Il est interdit is an **impersonal** expression. **Il** means **it NOT he**.



School rules - expressing obligation

1. It is forbidden =

Il est interdit de / d'

2. It is necessary =

Il est interdit d'utiliser les portables.
