

Doing something to yourself : Reflexive 'te'

- Sometimes, the 'doer' (subject) and 'receiver' (object) of an action are the same person.
- For example, '<u>you</u> prepare <u>yourself</u>' or '<u>I</u> prepare <u>myself</u>'
- Words like 'myself' or 'himself' are called **reflexive pronouns**.
- Spanish also has reflexive pronouns. When you talk about "you" doing an action to "yourself", use '**te**' <u>before</u> a verb.
- Look at the difference between:
 - Lavas el coche You wash the car <u>Te</u> lavas You wash yourself





Remember 'me' comes before a verb when I do the action to myself e.g. me lavo

Something to know for later! Reflexive pronouns can go **after** the infinitive form of a verb. For now, we will just practise reflexives when they come before verbs.



Almost any verb can be 'reflexive'!

hablar - to talk

hablas con tu amigo You talk with your friend te hablas □ You talk to yourself

sacar fotos – to take photos

sacas fotos de mi amigo You take photos of my friend You take photos of yourself te sacas fotos

escribir – to write

escribes a tu hermano te escribes

□ You write to your brother \Box You write to yourself





lavar – to wash

lavas el perroI You wash the dogte lavasI You wash [yourself]

levantar - to lift / get up / raise

levantas la mano 🛛 🗋 te levantas 🖉

You lift up/raise your hand
You get [yourself] up

despertar – to wake up

despiertas a tu madre te despiertas

You wake your mum upYou wake [yourself] up

In English, we don't always say the reflexive pronoun!

The 'reflexive meaning' is just assumed.



Talking about possessions Possessive adjectives (mi/mis and tu/tus)

- To say **'my'** in Spanish before a singular or uncountable noun, use **mi**.
- To say **'your'** in Spanish before a singular or uncountable noun, use **tu**.
- To say **'my'** in Spanish before a plural, use **mis**.
- To say **'your'** in Spanish before a plural, use **tus**.

Compare:

- Despierto a **mi** madre y **mis** hermanos. I wake **my**
- Despiertes a **tu** madre y **tus** hermanos. You wake y

ountable noun, use **mi.** countable noun, use **tu.**

It does not matter whether the noun is masculine or feminine.

I wake **my** mum and **my** brothers up.

You wake your mum and your brothers up.
