The conditional

The conditional is used to say what you **would do.** The endings for the conditional are added to the **infinitive**.

Mejoraría las calles. I would improve the streets.

To form the conditional add a new ending to the **infinitive**:

Conditional

This also applies to -ar, -er and -ir verbs!

To mean **'I' & 's/he',** just add – **ía** to the **infinitive.**

Invertir<mark>ía</mark> en transporte público.

I would invest in

public transport.

Imperfect

- To mean 'I' & 's/he' with -er &
- -ir verbs, we add -ía to the

stem.

- Invertía en transporte público.
 - I used to invest in public

transport.

-ar verbs add -aba to the stem instead.
