Saladin the Merciful

By 1176, the powerful Muslim leader Saladin called for *jihad* - a holy war- against the enemies of Islam.

In 1187, at the **Battle of Hattin**, Saladin and his armies crushed the Christians. His success, in 1189, saw the Crusaders reduced to the occupation of only three cities. The Muslims took back Jerusalem and other states. When Saladin reached Jerusalem, he allowed the Christians to leave safely which gave him the title "Saladin the Merciful".



Life for Christians

Crusaders were to be prisoners of war, they could **ransom** themselves or else be enslaved. 40 days was given for the residents to pay their ransom, but many failed to do so. Saladin later announced that all **elderly people**, who could not afford their freedom, were to be set free anyway. Moreover, he allowed all **noblewomen** to leave the city without ransom.



Life for Christians

The Al Agsa mosque was turned back to an Islamic place of worship and the Crusader cross was torn down. Other Crusader objects were also taken down. Some Christian churches were converted to mosques, although native Christians such as the Eastern Orthodox were allowed to stay and worship freely within the city in return for the tax and their churches remained.



Frankish rule ends

After losing Jerusalem, the Franks tried to fight back but without much success.

However, the Muslims now faced a threat from the Mongols and the armies of Genghis Khan. The Mongols attacked with such violence and some accounts say they killed up to 800,000 people. Some Franks considered joining the Mongols to help defeat Muslim rule. The Mongols, however, were driven out with the help of another Muslim group called the **Mamluks** and by 1291, the last of the Franks had been expelled from the Holy land.

Glossary

Jihad: 'holy war' against enemies of Islam.

Mongols: group of people from Asia.

Mamluks: Muslim group of people.

Ransom: sum of money demanded for release.

Converted: changed.
