


This is Me: Music Activity

How to make a singing spoon (with an adult).



Do not make this spoon without an adult present for help and guidance. Please make sure the area you work in is protected by newspaper or a plastic cover and that you wear an apron to avoid spoiling your clothes. Please use children's safety scissors and only PVA glue (nothing stronger or containing solvents) should be used.






You will need.....

- A wooden spoon
- A paper plate
- Scissors
- PVA glue and an applicator or brush
- A peg
- Paints and a brush or felt tip pens
- Decoration such as wool, google eyes, pipe cleaners, glitter etc.





1. Draw two lines as if your plate were a clock telling the time as 2:30. Cut along the lines, towards the middle of your paper plate in a straight line, then cut out towards the edge.




2. Bring the cut edges together and overlap them to make a cone shape.






3. Glue a 2cm wide strip with PVA to fasten the edges together so the plate is in a cone shape.




4. Peg the edges together to hold in place until the glue is dry. If your plate is stiff and the glue does not hold, you may need to use some sellotape or masking tape to hold in place until dry.




5. Once the glue is dry, paint or decorate the cone with felt tip pens.



6. Once the paint is dry or you have finished decorating the cone, carefully cut a hole at the point of the cone large enough to fit the handle of your spoon through.







7. Take your spoon out of the cone and decorate it with a face, hair, eyes and any extras that you would like.

8. Give your singing spoon a name. They will be your singing friend for the next 5 weeks!
