Teacher notes- Lesson 3

-Learning Intention: To know who we can talk to in our community and what is appropriate to say to who.

1. Make a list of all the people you come across in your day that you might talk to.
2. Create three headings to categorise these people- 'see', 'talk', 'share'.
3. Discuss each person on the list and decide who they just see, who they talk to, and who they can share things with in their community.
4. Think of examples of appropriate things that they could say to each person, e.g. saying thank you to the bus driver, asking the shop assistant how much the bread costs and sharing how they are feeling with their parent or teacher.

You will need: Pen or pencil, four sheets of paper.



- If you talk a lot think about minimising your conversation with less familiar people.
- If you talk less in public set yourself a challenge of asking for help in a shop.
