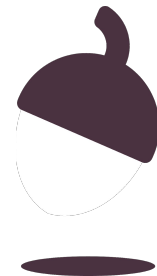

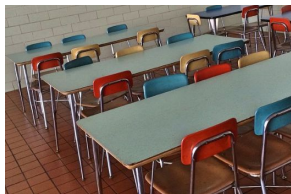


Il y a - There is or there are

Il y a un terrain de sport



Il y a une cantine



Il y a des salles de classe



Il y a is followed by a word to show
how many items there are.

This is likely to be **un / une / des**

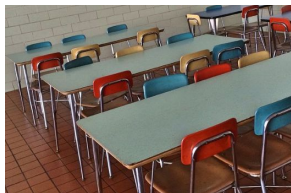


Il n'y a pas - There is not or there are not

Il n'y a pas **de** terrain de sport



Il n'y a pas **de** cantine



Il n'y a pas **de** salles de classe



Il n'y a pas is followed by **DE** or **D'**

This shows that there aren't **any** of the mentioned items



Describing school

1. There is = **Il y a**
2. There are = **Il y a**
3. There is not = **Il n'y a pas**
4. There aren't = **Il n'y a pas**
5. There is not or there aren't is followed by
the word = **de**
