| Australia | Smallest continent Sometimes called Australasia or Oceania. Contains Australia, New Zealand, and many islands. | Europe | 10 million | 740 million |
| Antarctica | Third smallest continent. Extremely cold, covered in ice. Doubles in size in winter when the seas freeze. Contains 90% of the world's ice. No humans live in Antarctica permanently. | North America | 24 million | 590 million |
