
Negatives sentences with ni...ni, tampoco and ninguno

¿Cómo se pronuncian?

Opción 1

No **gan**an porque no hay **goles**.

Opción 2

¡No ten**gas** **guard**ado el **guacamole** en la **guan**tera del coche!

Opción 3

El **gato** grande, **gordo** y **gandul** vive con la **gata**, **gorda** y **gandula**.

Opción 4

Como tu **gusto** no **gusta** del **gusto** que **gusta** mi **gusto**, mi **gusto** no **gusta** del **gusto** que **gusta** tu **gusto**.

'Ni' translates into English as '**nor**' and it is used instead of '**or**'.

No voy al instituto **ni** a mi casa.



We often avoid this when speaking and say 'or' instead.

*I'm not going to school **nor** to my house.*

When you negate two words of the **same type** (two nouns, two adjectives, two adverbs) use '**ni...ni**', which means '**neither...nor**'.

No hay **ni** mesas **ni** sillas en mi instituto.



*There are **neither** tables **nor** chairs in my secondary school.*



Tampoco also means ‘**neither**’ or ‘**either**’. Use this adverb with a verb to add another negative detail to one you just mentioned:

No hay mesas en mi insti, **tampoco** hay sillas.



*There are no tables at my school, **neither** are there any chairs.*

Tampoco can also go at the end of the sentence, if you put **no** at the start:

No hay mesas en mi insti, y **no** hay sillas **tampoco**.



*There are no tables at my school and there are no chairs **either**.*



Remember never to use **también** in negative sentences.

El instituto no tiene biblioteca y **tamXién** tiene comedor.

*The secondary school does not have a library and **neither** does it have a dining hall.*



Alguno means **some** or **any**. Use it when not being exact about the number or nature of the thing you refer to:

En esta parte de mi instituto hay **alguna** oficina, **algún** edificio.



Alguno = **algún** in front of a **m** noun.

In this part of my school there is some office, some building (or other).

Algunas aulas están bien equipadas.



Some rooms are well-equipped.

En **algunos** lugares hay mucho espacio.



In **some** places there is a lot of space.

Alguno works like an adjective here, and changes its endings for **m, f**, singular and plural.



Ninguno means **none, not a, (not) any or no**.

Use it in negative sentences:

En esta parte de mi instituto **no** hay **ninguna** oficina.



*In this part of my school there is **not an / no** office.*

En esta parte de mi instituto **no** hay **ningún** edificio.



ninguno = **ningún** in front of a **m** noun.

*In this part of my school there is **not a / no** building.*

Note: **Ninguno** is not usually used with plural nouns.
