The Irregular Verb **eo**

- The Latin verb **eo** ('to go') is irregular in the present tense.
- In other forms and tenses, it has the very short stem **i-**.

Tense	Latin	English
Present	<i>eo, i-</i>	I go
Imperfect	<i>ibam</i>	I was going
Perfect	<i>ivi, ii</i>	I went
Pluperfect	<i>iveram, ieram</i>	I had gone



The Irregular Verb *eo*

<i>eo</i>	I go
<i>is</i>	You (s) go
<i>it</i>	She goes
<i>imus</i>	We go
<i>itis</i>	You (pl) go
<i>eunt</i>	They go
<i>ire</i> (infinitive)	to go
<i>i</i> (imperative, s)	Go! (s)
<i>ite</i> (imperative, pl)	Go! (pl)
<i>iens, eunt-</i> (pres part)	going



The Irregular Verb *eo* - Compound Verbs

Prefix		Compound	
Latin	English	Latin	English
<i>ab-</i>	away	<i>abeo, abi-</i>	I go away
<i>ad-</i>	towards	<i>adeo, adi-</i>	I go towards
<i>circum-</i>	around	<i>circumeo, circumi-</i>	I go around
<i>ex-</i>	out of	<i>exeo, exi-</i>	I go out, exit
<i>in-</i>	into	<i>ineo, ini-</i>	I go into, enter
<i>red-</i>	back	<i>redeo, redi-</i>	I go back, return
<i>trans-</i>	across	<i>transeo, transi-</i>	I go across

Perfect tense: always *-ii* in compounds
***pereo* = 'I die' (not 'I go through')**
