

Negation using **nicht** and **kein**



Using **nicht** to mean **not**

To say **not** with
adjectives we use

nicht

Die Farbe ist **nicht**
blau.

Using **kein** to say not **a**

To say **not a** with
nouns we use **kein/e**

Das ist **kein** Ding.

Das ist **keine**
Nummer.



Using **nicht** and **kein/keine/kein**

When you use **nicht** with an adjective you just put it in front to make the sentence negative.

Das Tier ist **nicht** groß.

The animal is **not** big.

Die Farbe ist **nicht** blau.

The colour is **not** blue.

This is the
same as
English.



Using nicht and kein/ keine/ kein

kein/ keine/ kein go before a noun.

Das ist **keine** Form.

Kein works like ein/ eine/ ein and matches the gender of the noun.

Masculine: Das ist **kein** Ort.

Feminine: Das ist **keine** Farbe.

Neuter: Das ist **kein** Ding.

Sein in the 1st and 2nd person singular



The verb sein

- The verb sein means to be
- It is an irregular verb. This means it doesn't follow the normal verb pattern.
- We are going to look at the 1st and 2nd person singular.





The verb sein

ich bin = I am



du bist = you are





Saying what things are not:

1. To say not in front of an adjective you use **nicht** .
2. To say not/ no with a noun you use **kein** . or
— **keine**
3. Kein follows the pattern of **ein**.
4. Ich bin means I **am** . in English.
5. Du bist means **you are** .



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
