# The Great Purge

The Great Purge, also known as the “Great Terror,” was a brutal political campaign led by Soviet dictator Joseph Stalin to get rid of **dissenting** members of the Communist Party and anyone else he considered a threat.

It is believed that at least 750,000 people were **executed** during the Great Purge. More than a million other people were sent to forced labor camps, known as Gulags.

Upon Stalin’s rise to power, some members of the former Bolshevik party began to question his authority. Stalin believed anyone with ties to the original Communist government was a threat to his leadership and needed to go.
