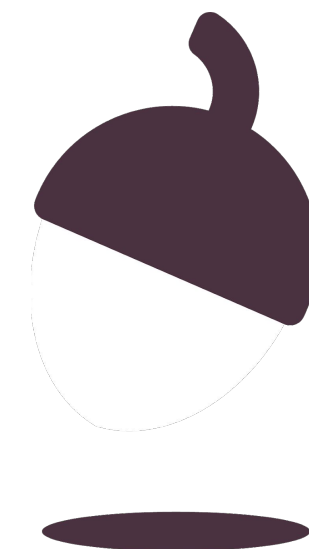

# Use of 1st person: present and near future tense

To talk about **'I'** with an action **you do now**, remove the infinitive ending (AR/ER/IR) and add **-o**.

llam**ar**            llam            llam**o**      *I call*

To talk about **'I'** with an action **you are going to do**, use 'voy + a + infinitive'

voy a llamar            *I am going to call*



# The personal 'a'

A personal 'a' is needed when the object of a verb is a known or identified person or animal.

Cuido **a** mi hermano menor.

*I look after my younger brother.*

We don't need to  
translate the 'a'.

We don't need the personal 'a' when the person isn't identified yet.

Busco un amigo.

*I'm looking for a friend.*

Busco **a** mi amigo.

*I'm looking for my friend.*



# Use of personal 'a' VS. 'a' meaning 'to'

We also use the word 'a' to mean 'to'.

## Compare:

Personal 'a'      'to'

Acompaño **a** mi tía **a** la tienda.

I accompany my aunt **to** the shop.

Acompaño **a** mi abuelo **al** supermercado.

I accompany my grandfather **to** the supermarket.

Remember, when 'a' is followed by 'el' in a sentence, they join together to become 'al'.
