



The definite article - The

- 1, If a noun is **masculine** and **singular** (and does NOT begin with a vowel or 'h') the word for 'the' is '**le**'
- 2, If a noun is **feminine** and **singular** (and does NOT begin with a vowel or 'h') the word for 'the' is '**la**'
- 3, If a noun is **singular** and begins with a **vowel** or '**h**' the word for 'the' shortens to '**l'**'
- 3, If a noun is **plural** the word for 'the' is '**les**'
